The YWCA Regina exists to support and empower women, children and youth in addressing their diverse needs in the realization of their full potential, which benefits all. And further, it exists so that:

Women, children and youth are safe, secure and free from abuse,

Women and children are empowered and supported in making healthy choices,

Women and youth are respected and are valued members of their community, and

Women are empowered to take control of their own lives and work towards a better world for themselves and other women.

Our most important stories

are the ones that happen behind the scenes—quiet but life-changing turning points in the lives of women, girls and families. That's the primary focus of our work, and of this Annual Report.

But some stories are very much on a public stage. Front and centre in 2010 was our 100th Anniversary celebration—including a fabulous Street Fair in June, and a Time Capsule Ceremony in September. These events brought opportunity to establish new relationships in the community, and to reconnect with many “old friends”. Program initiatives included the launch of Village Networks for Single Mothers in January. And in March, we opened the 90-space Century Crescent Child Care Centre—bringing our total child care spaces to 220.



Of course, none of this would happen without the support of the community—from our major government and corporate funders, to the faithful volunteers who devote their time and passion to our work. As we move into our second century, a special thanks to them—and to our amazing staff for sticking with us through a time of rapid change and growth.
